THE 14 PRINCIPLES OF TOM:

- 1. Create constancy of purpose for the improvement of product and service.
- 2. Adopt the new philosophy.
- 3. Cease dependence on mass inspection.
- 4. End the practice of purchase by price tag alone.
- 5. Constantly and forever improve the system of production and service.
- 6. Institute training.
- 7. Adopt and Institute leadership.
- 8. Drive out fear.
- Break down barriers to communication between departments.
- 10. Eliminate siogans, exhortations, and targets.
- 11. a) End numeric guotas for production workers.
 - b) End numeric goals for managers.
- 12. Remove barriers to pride in workmanship.
- 13. Encourage education and self-improvement for the workforce.
- 14. Put everyone to work on the transformation.

THE SEVEN DEADLY DISEASES:

- 1. Lack of constancy of purpose.
- 2. Focus on short-term financial returns.
- 3. Performance evaluations, merit ratings, or annual reviews.
- 4. Mobility of management.
- 5. Management by visible numbers only.
- 6. Excessive medical costs.
- 7. Excessive cost of warranty fueled by contingency-fee lawyers.

THE OBSTACLES:

- 1. Hopes for "Hasty Pudding," I.e., quick fixes.
- 2. Gadgetry/automation/"techno-solutions."
- 3. Copycat-ism; adopting someone else's system.
- 4. "Yes, but" excuses: "Our problems are different..."
- 5. "Our QC department handles all of our problems."
- 6. Blame the workers.
- 7. False starts.
- 8. "We installed quality control, that's all that's necessary."
- 9. "We need only meet the specifications..."
- 10. The Fallacy of "Zero Defects."
